Congregational Update – Consistory voted unanimously to join the Dakota Network, which has already added Alliance churches in Minnesota and Iowa. Several other Wisconsin churches are joining us in forming a "cluster" within the network. The Wisconsin Cluster is forming an Administrative Team with pastors and elder representatives from each church. Bill Bruins was appointed to this team. The team will appoint a representative to the Dakota Network Board. The hope is to hive-off a new network as this one will soon have over 60 churches. The Network is responsible for overseeing a Network Ordination Team, which walks with and recommends pastors to the global Alliance Ordination Team, and a Network Covenant Keeper Team, which oversees and supports consistories and churches in their covenanting. We are excited about the future and ask you to join us in prayer as we move forward.
