ARTICLES Who Cares? (Part 10 of Pathways to Maturity)

Who cares about me?

That's the question most people are asking. We lament... "No one calls me," "No one asks me out," "No one really cares if I come."

Back in Junior High, I distinctly remember that massive lunchroom. There were two, actually. Windows on one side; cinder blocks on the other sides; and tables for 8 stretching from wall to wall. Pale yellow walls and sterile white floors still haunt me. (Maybe that's why I was glad to see the yellow



kitchen in the parsonage get painted.) **The only thing more drab was my soul longing to be accepted.** That room is where I stood among a couple hundred peers and yet felt all alone.


I found out in college, I was not alone. Every other freshman was searching for the same thing. Connection. Compassion. Care.

With all our technology created to help us be social, we are seeing an enormous gap in actual connectedness. We can see what all our friends are doing... without us. We sink into a "black sheep" mentality... "I don't fit in." "I don't belong."

The 10th competency for ordination in the Alliance is vital for all of us, as it addresses this monstrous, awful problem. The competency is called "Pastoral Care," but it's not just for pastors.

You see, the Good Shepherd in John 10:11 gave his life for his sheep. He has

defeated the thief (10:10), protects his sheep from the wolves (10:12), and rescues lost sheep (10:16). We have a loving Shepherd who calls us to abide in Him (John 15).



As God's sheep, we no longer walk alone and are consumed with the need for acceptance and love from others. We are blessed with the fellowship of the

Holy Spirit (Phil. 2:1; 2 Cor. 13:14). We are being strengthened inwardly day by day! (2 Cor. 4:16)

That should be enough, but God also gave us the support of the Church. After Jesus washed the feet of the disciples he told them...

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." John 13:34 (NIV)

The church is defined by this love and care for one another. Jesus would later turn to Peter and say, "Take care of my sheep." (John 21:16) "Care" (poimainō) means to shepherd, tend, or pasture; and figuratively, to lead, guide, or rule.

Did you catch the shift? The sheep become shepherds!

Yes, pastors and elders are shepherds. Their shepherding must include devotion to prayer and teaching (Acts 6:4; James 5:14; 1 Tim 3:2), particularly guarding against wolves that bring division and heresy (Acts 20:28-31; 1 Peter 5:1-4).

Deacons also shepherd the believers, as they were given responsibility for caring for the widows (Acts 6:1-3).

We also see Paul calling the church to care for one another (1 Cor. 12:25-26). In many ways, we might even say that the churches become shepherds to Paul (the

missionary/pastor). Not that they had authority over him, but that they cared for his needs (Phil. 4:10-17).

Sheep are becoming shepherds!

So, Who Cares?

Let's make some practical application to all this.

1. Jesus cares about you! **If you are struggling with feeling accepted and loved, look first to Jesus. Look second to Jesus. Look third to Jesus.** If you look to others, even the church, you will be disappointed. Some, I fear, are so cared for by family and the church that they see little need to actually go to Jesus. **Unfortunately, many find it's much easier to just call mom or a best friend and vent than to go to Jesus.** Will you bow your knee in prayer and find comfort in Jesus?

2. The church cares about you. I guarantee there are believers who care about you. At prayer on Tuesday morning, we lamented over sex trafficking and prayed for those to whom we cannot put a name. We care. We just don't always know how to help. **Don't give up on the church.** God has a whole lot of amazing shepherds

3. You must care for others. We see in 1 Corinthians 12 the many ways which God gifts his sheep to shepherd others. Some teach, some help, some give, some organize, some encourage... Shepherding happens in all kinds of ways. Sure, it might be a "pastoral visit" where I read some Scripture and pray, but you can do your part. Maybe you just need to listen, bring a meal, send a note, or sing a song. **Find your niche and be the shepherd God made you to be.**

Look at it this way, life is a lunchroom and someone needs you to eat with them.

PRAY: Lord, I've been a lonely sheep for too long. Be my shepherd. Lay me down in green pasture. Lead me to the still waters. Restore my soul. Help me rest in you and become the shepherd you made me to be. Open my eyes in the lunchroom to see the one in need and give me courage to shepherd that one. Amen.

Alliance Ordination Pathway 2.0 is in development as the Ordination Team appointed a sub team to this task. This is an exciting time to pursue ministry and the Alliance created a whole new way to be ordained. Instead of having to spend 7 years in school, we've developed a way to train and evaluate candidates for 36 core competencies. I've been writing about the 12 areas in the AMEN for months. Pathways 2.0 will flesh out the training and evaluation of the other 144 competencies. Much of this aligns with seminary education, but it adds heart and hand competencies to the head competencies. Randy McDaniel and Ian Van Wyk are well on their way.

The Midwest Network Admin Team discussed the hiring process for the network communication position, staff compensation resources, the pastor's retreat, and the makeup of the Network Admin Team and whether we should add another elder representative or redo the structure completely.
